Barker's 70th Anniversary – An Evening to Remember, A Legacy to Celebrate

On March 5, The Barker Adoption Foundation celebrated its 70th Anniversary at a Benefit Gala at the beautiful National Museum of Women in the Arts. Over 340 friends and family members, Barker trustees and

staff, gala committee members and a host of volunteers, birth parents and parents who have adopted, those who were adopted and those who have supported their adoptions, sponsors and donors, and many others spanning several generations gathered to celebrate Barker's

70-year legacy of providing lifelong adoption services to all members of the adoption community.

The Gala team, co-chaired by Rachel Firschein, Maureen Golden, and Mary Jaffe, who previously headed up Barker's 65th Anniversary event, worked tirelessly for months to create a memorable evening held amidst the

artwork of the museum's galleries and the grandeur of its Great Hall. Guests were first welcomed to enjoy cocktails and live music by a youthful and talented string ensemble coached by a Barker dad, James Hutchens. Surrounded by stunning artwork, the guests were then invited to bid on 112 unique silent auction items and to try their luck on winning 60 bottles of wine in the Mystery Wine Pull, a new and popular addition to the auction. Special thanks go to veteran auction volunteers Barb Dellinger, Susan Goldberg, and Maureen Golden for co-chairing the event's successful silent auction. Proceeds from the auction, along with generous donations from gala sponsors under the leadership of Rob DeLucia, plus an outpouring of contributions from guests during the end of the evening appeal, all combined to generate critical revenues to help ensure that Barker flourishes for generations to come.

Guests then settled in at tables artfully decorated by Jean Diamond's talented team of

volunteers for a delicious, multi-course dinner catered by Federal City Caterers. The program began with a warm welcome from Steve Inskeep, host of NPR's Morning Edition – and father of three, one of whom joined the family by adoption through Barker – who graciously served as the evening's Master of Ceremonies. Barker Board of Trustees Chair John Freeman joined Steve in welcoming everyone. Next up was featured guest speaker Jelani Freeman, Barker Trustee since 2005 and powerful advocate for children and youth, whose poignant story of being placed in the foster care system at age 9, experiencing multiple foster homes, shelters, and facilities before aging out of the system at age 18, was a powerful testimony to the critical work of serving children of all ages in need of loving homes through programs like Barker's own Project Wait No Longer.

Barker Executive Director and CEO Marilyn Regier shared her special insights into Barker's rich

FROM THE Executive Director and CEO

During the aftermath of the flood in Barker's suite, I kept close at hand a most relevant book, psychiatrist Norman Rosenthal's provocative *The Gift of Adversity: The Unexpected Benefits of Life's Difficulties, Setbacks, and Imperfections*. He believes that many of life's most important lessons come not during times of smooth sailing but when we must navigate the rivers of adversity. (I find myself using water imagery a lot lately, having just emerged from almost a year of surviving the flood at Barker.)

On the cusp of our Annual Fund drive and our 70th Anniversary gala, we gathered one Sunday morning, breathing in the fetid air from the water-soaked office, determined to handle this emergency. We were able to initiate a complex restoration plan that included moving for the next eight months to much smaller quarters on the seventh floor.

Many of you have called or written over the past months, asking what else you can do to help. In the next few weeks, I will be sending a letter to the Barker community about this subject, but for now, I simply want to express deepest

gratitude to the Board of Trustees, the staff, various community organizations who came to our aid, and to so many of you in the "Barker family." After many long months, we are finally "back home." And as I wrote in our Annual Report, "Resilience to overcome the unexpected is nothing new to an agency founded in 1945." Thank you from the bottom of my heart.

Barker Hosts Beth Hall of Pact

On Thursday, October 13, The Barker Adoption Foundation was pleased to host Beth Hall, a nationally recognized expert and author on transracial adoption,

and the co-founder of Pact, An Adoption Alliance, at a presentation for adoptive parents. Pact is a California-based organization dedicated to serving the needs



of adopted children of color and their families on issues of adoption and race. Beth, a past speaker at Barker's Annual Conference, gave her presentation to a "full-house" of adoptive parents focused on promoting a race-conscious, child-centered, and honesty-based approach to adoption, and on promoting healthy identity in adopted children of color.

For the past fifteen years Pact has operated a highly successful family camp every year in California where adopted children (infants up to 18 year olds) and their families, have the opportunity to share experiences and build community, while learning from experts and each other. The camp includes specific

workshops and programs for adopted children and teens, adoptive parents, siblings (who were not adopted) and birth parents. Camp participants have described the camp experience as "transformative" and very meaningful to their families, and many families return year after year.

Next summer Pact will hold its first ever East Coast camp, which will take place at the Pearlstone Conference Center, outside of Baltimore, from July 31–August 4, 2017. Barker's Annual Adoption and Foster Care Conference Announced

Barker's 23rd Annual Adoption and Foster Care Conference will be held on Saturday, March 25, at The Universities at Shady Grove Conference Center. The conference is entitled: *"My Family is My Family: From Ambivalence to Acceptance."* **Ashley Rhodes-Courter** will be the Keynote Speaker, inspiring us on the themes of the day.

Ashley was born is 1985 to a single teen mother. By the age of three, Ashley was in Florida's foster care system, where she spent almost ten years being shuttled between 14 homes before being adopted at the age of 12. Her academic achievements are numerous, including a Master's Degree in Social Work from the University of Southern California.

In 2003 the *New York Times Magazine* published a prize-winning essay she wrote about her adoption day. Ashley expanded the essay into a memoir, *Three Little Words*, which was published by Simon & Schuster in 2008

and quickly became a *New York Times* bestseller, then an international bestseller. Her memoir is currently being made into a major motion picture.

How did she arrive at the title? "On my adoption day, I was sullen and wary, so when the judge asked if I wanted to be adopted, I mumbled, 'I guess so,'" capturing the ambivalence that is part of our provocative conference theme.

In 2016 she wrote a sequel, *Three More Words*. Ashley is now married. She has fostered children, adopted children, and birthed children. Her awards are numerous.

Another distinguished speaker will be **Tara Linh Leaman, JD**. She currently serves as Program Director of Westchester County Department of Social Services "Westchester Building Futures," a multi-year initiative funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Children's Bureau that assists children, youth, and young adults in foster care and/or alumni of care. As an alumna of international foster care and an experienced transethnic adoptee, Tara knows well the joys of transforming adversity to resilience. She is a graduate of Cornell University and Georgetown Law School. Please mark the date – March 25 – and come to be deeply challenged and inspired. ■

The 2016 Colombia Homeland Tour: A Most Memorable Travel Experience

In June, the Barker Adoption Foundation's Colombia Homeland Tour group returned home from our fabulous trip to Bogota, Colombia. The Tour was composed of 29 individuals made up of 7 families from Connecticut, New York, Maryland and New Jersey with children ranging from school aged to young adults. While we have settled back into our daily lives, I am certain that each of us continues to embrace a special fondness and appreciation of our experiences while visiting our children's homeland.

My son Michael was born in Bogota 25 years ago. I always wanted to return and show him his country of origin, and this became the right year for our trip. Bogota was now very safe, my summer teaching schedule was lighter than usual, and Michael was ready and eager to explore Colombia.

Travel arrangements for the Colombian Homeland Tour could not have gone smoother. And on June 20th, we arrived at the modern Bogota International airport, and immediately I saw a transformed city from what I remembered from 1991. Delightfully, the first faces we saw after immigration were the Barker Team, Sue Hollar, Carolina Kenrick, and Barbara Donesky. What I was unaware of at that time was not only were they excellent travel guides, each with distinctly delightful personalities, but that I would glean so much knowledge from each of them about adoption.

After meeting everyone from the group the next morning at breakfast, we set out for FANA (Fundacion para la Asistencia de la Ninez Abandonada) led by Maria Teresa de Perez, the 4th member of Barker's team. Throughout the trip she graciously shared her knowledge about all aspects of Colombia. Upon our arrival, we toured the expansive building and grounds, where the children appeared playful, happy and so very well cared for. FANA was immaculate,

and innovative programs for both orphans and daycare preschoolers were evident. Visiting FANA was emotional, and I truly felt that I was experiencing *déjà vu*. I'm a nurse; accustomed to being strong, stoic, and in control of my emotions, but I was moved, especially when I saw the original gold tree of life where Michael was presented to us by FANA's Founder, Mercedes Rosario de Martinez.

As I passed a beautiful portrait of Mercedes, I reflected on how truly amazing she was, changing life courses for thousands of children and families. During our visits 25 years ago, I was consumed with the process of adopting Michael and bringing him home. Now this visit, I marveled in complete admiration that one woman could initiate this tremendous humanitarian action, advancing and expanding FANA year after year; such that at present, approximately 13,000 children have been adopted into families across the globe.

While at FANA we were greeted and well cared for by Elena Martinez, Director, and Maria Lucia Martinez, Director of the Hogar Margarita (FANA's home for birth

mothers), who are daughters of Mercedes and who are continuing their mother's legacy and life work. Additionally, Maria Teresa Maldonado, FANA Administrative Director, sensitively shared available information, contingent on the child's age, with each of the families on the tour

From day one of the trip, there was a highly visible connection among all those our group. A bond was formed and the adopted youth shared a commonality that perhaps they had not experienced previously. I marveled at how Michael blossomed on this trip; normally quiet and introverted, he was outgoing, social, and fully engaged in all aspects of FANA and Colombian life. I quite frankly had never seen him so happy!

On day two, our group prepared beautiful baskets with cosmetics, toiletries, scarves, journals, and other items for women living at the Hogar Margarita. This experience as well as the opportunity to meet with Maria Lucia provided us with a realistic understanding of the challenging life circumstances faced by pregnant women considering adoption. Finally, our afternoon at FANA

was spent playing outside with the children and included parachute play, face painting, bubble blowing, and lively soccer games. Both the children at FANA and our children had a marvelous time together, displaying an overt connection with each other.

The trip was a blend of experiences. While visiting FANA was intense and highly emotional, many aspects of the trip were educational, insightful, fun, exciting, and still very relaxing. For instance, we ate empanadas while watching an intense Chilean vs. Colombian soccer game. We also visited historical and cultural landmarks, toured the Presidential Palace, Casa Narino, and enjoyed a walking tour of La Candelaria. Visits to the Nemocon Salt Mine, the Gold Museum, the Botero Museum, and the Colon Theater kept us busy and facilitated a comprehensive tour of the best of Bogota. Some of my personal favorites were the times spent at Monserrat, where tremendous heights provided a panoramic view of the entire city; shopping at a flea market in Usaquen with every imaginable artifact, and the

unforgettable visit to the coffee distributor, where we learned about quality coffee in a fun – filled environment.

Our days at FANA were very emotional, and throughout the trip, there was much to process. Fortunately, at night, we had group sessions (parents and children separately) to explore our feelings and responses to what I term our adoption immersion. As our trip was ending, I saw that many of our children did not want to leave. They bonded with each other and experienced a life event that was unique to them, and perhaps facilitated an understanding about themselves that could not be grasped outside of Colombia. Although I believed myself to be educated about adoption, I realized on this trip that I had much to learn, much to ponder, and that I would continue to process

the information I gained on this trip over time. I also know that this trip brought my son and I much closer together. I am more empathetic and open to the issues of adoption, considerate of all views, more cognizant of the importance of culture and genetics, and hopefully more supportive of his life desires, whatever they may be. Perhaps it is really true that you can't determine your future until you know your past. Returning to Colombia was an enchanting experience and I believe essential for further growth and development, not just for the children of FANA, but for the parents as well.

From the bottom of my heart, I thank the Barker Adoption Foundation for their compassion, expertise and guided support on this most memorable journey. It was a trip of a lifetime! ■

CONNECT, Project Wait No Longer's Mentorship Program Launches

On July 14, 2016, Project Wait No Longer conducted its first official Mentor Training for the new Mentorship Program, CONNECT. The CONNECT Mentor Program is designed to pair adult mentors who have an adoption or foster care history with youth who have been recently placed for adoption through the PWNL program. Spending time with a mentor allows adopted youth to share and process with someone who shares their experience and helps to foster meaningful relationships within the community.

Mentorship is a contributing factor to the success of countless youth. Youth with mentors have been shown to be 55% more likely to enroll in college, 78% more likely to volunteer regularly, and 130% more likely to hold leadership positions. Mentors through the CONNECT Program provide an

opportunity for adopted youth to learn, grow, and share in a positive and nurturing relationship.

Currently, the CONNECT Program has two mentors who are trained and ready to meet the needs of adoptees in PWNL and are



excited to mentor youth with whom they have a close experiential connection. Several others are almost trained and ready to join the team. Mentors are set to begin working with their mentees by year's end.

myself, such as seeing a psychiatrist and getting accommodations set up through the school to help even out the playing field.

Ultimately, I was able to get through high school and apply to college. Even though I didn't get accepted into my first or second choice, I did get in! I am currently an uprising sophomore at my University and serve as the Co-President of the Honors Academy with a 3.84 GPA. Still

today, every time I walk into class I feel a tightness in my chest and the sudden urge to just walk out. I still feel like I am not as intelligent as the other students, but I push through it and play my cards day by day and hope and pray for the rest.

At the end of the day, playing your crappy hand is better than not playing at all and losing without even getting the chance to try. ■
